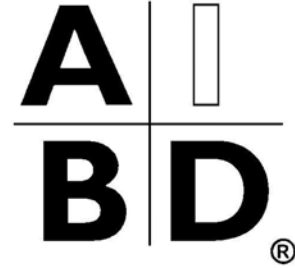

AIBD's College of Fellows Announces Scholarship Recipients

The announcements came during the AIBD 59th Annual Convention held in Portland, Oregon. Each year, two \$1000 scholarships are awarded, the College of Fellows, the College Scholarship and the Annette Farmer Scholarship.

The 2009 Recipient of the College of Fellows Scholarship is James M. Van Staalduin, the son of AIBD Certified Professional Member, Len Van Staalduin, in Greenville, North Carolina.
